

*Community Advisory Council Minutes Summary*

Advisory Council Members approved the April minutes without any additions or corrections.

The agenda was approved without any additional agenda items. Advisory Council members agreed to changes to meeting dates and locations as presented by the coordinator.

Discussion of the upcoming Community Health Assessment, and the plan for it to take place 2018-19. Overview agenda item by asking what events are happening in the community that the Columbia Pacific CCO is a part of, and also what can the CAC do to participate? It was explained that part of the CAC's role is to develop the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) which is a five-year plan that will be renewed &/or changed June 2019. Oregon Health Authority (OHA) asks that the CAC has input on what health priorities should be in the CHIP. CPCCO is working with community partners and contracted providers to assess the needs in the community and (with the advisory council input) to align as much as possible on community health improvement priority areas. It was questioned what the CAC's role be in this, and was explained that beyond the development of the survey and questions for the community, there will also be a need for volunteers to collect stories/narratives from a cross section of the community.

The CAC discussed elements of a presentation given at the April meeting. It was pointed out that rural Oregon economic growth has remained the same, while urban economic growth continues to rise. The CAC discussed how a major issue from the data presented was that the livable wage necessary in Clatsop County was drastically high, and there was an in depth discussion around the barriers to low-income residents in Clatsop County including parents not being able to get their children to Head Start and the difference between Federal and State guidelines of safety and transportation. It was noted that it is a national trend that 5-7% of Medicaid members make up 50%+ of the care costs. In Clatsop County there has been a care team assembled to provide one on one time with those high risk members, and a member noted that he has already witnessed great work from the care team. To further the discussion of community needs the advisory council decided to continue to review community health data related to CHIP priority areas.

The Innovator Agent Update was provided, and discussion relating what is happening in legislature and the CHIP priority areas ensued.

The opioid summit that occurred in April in Clatsop County was addressed, and the Advisory Council discussed areas in which Clatsop County is looking at the opioid crisis, and the involvement of trauma-informed care.
